Dear Mr. Paull,

Since I last wrote you I have received an offer of a lease on the Parka Tin Mines, St. Enoder, half a mile from St. Colomb Road Station, 108 acres, which has been favourably reported on by W.H. Goodchild A.R.S.M., with whom you no doubt are acquainted.

The property has been at some time worked on a small scale down to the Adit Level, and three levels, at 10, 20, and 30 fathoms respectively, have been opened, and apparently a rich shoot of ore has been stoped out up to the Adit Level.

On the North-South section there appear to be six *Easterly* lodes, nearly vertical, which dip down to a large flat lode called the White Works Lode. There are also six lodes running North and South.

It appears that in one year, ore averaging 112 lbs. of black tin per ton was treated in a stamp mill.

I cannot find out what was the result of working or what was the price of tin at the time it was worked, but Goodchild evidently thinks well of the property, and expresses the opinion that the Mine could be opened up and brought to the producing stage in a comparatively short space of time with a relatively small capital outlay.

I expect you know all about this Mine, probably a great deal more than Mr. Goodchild knows, and could tell me whether it is worth while running down to Cornwall to see it. Some of the lodes run North and South whilst others run East and West.
